Mike Kellogg—Northridge CA



Michael began square dancing at the age of 21 and started calling almost immediately in 1983. Dancers today know him for his high energy, exuberant, and uplifting calling style; and his technical but "down to earth" teaching. It's hard not to have fun when you're dancing to Michael's lively presentation. During the 80s and 90s Michael called squares full time, traveling extensively throughout the U.S., Europe, and Japan. He has now reduced his traveling schedule and works full-time during the day as a systems analyst for Technicolor in Camarillo, California. He teaches beginner level thru C2 on a weekly basis and calls for special events on many weekends. Michael's travel is restricted mostly to weekends now, but he manages to do about two out-of-town events each month. In addition to these events he calls two to three weeks in Europe every year, and one week in Japan every other year. Michael has shared the calling

privileges for Tinseltown Squares in Los Angeles for the past eight years, teaching A2 and challenge programs, while Paul Waters teaches beginners and A1. If you're in West Hollywood on a Monday night be sure to look them up.


Betsy Gotta—North Brunswick NJ



Betsy has been square dancing since 1952 and calling since 1962. She calls all programs from Contra through C-3B and is an accredited Callerlab Caller Coach. Averaging over 200 dances/classes per year, Betsy has attended the last 57 consecutive National Square Dance conventions and called at the last 55 of them. She has called throughout the US and Canada as well as England, Germany & Sweden. Betsy also is the featured caller for instructional videos produced by Square Dance Videos Inc. and sold by Gottadance Videos, and has recorded for County Line, Desert Gold and Gold Rush Records. She has been a member of Callerlab since 1976 where she served 9 terms on the Board of Governors. She is the only person ever to have served on the Executive Committees of Callerlab, Roundalab, Contralab, ARTS-Dance, and Legacy. She was also General Chairman of the 1992 NJ State Convention, and square dance program chairman for the 2000 NSDC in Baltimore. In 2001, at the

IAGSDC Convention in Vancouver, Betsy received the Golden Boot Award, for her efforts to bridge the gap between gay and straight square dance clubs. In 2006, at the CALLERLAB Convention in Charlotte, Betsy received the Milestone Award, CALLERLAB's highest honor, for her numerous contributions to the square dance activity. At the 2012 National Square Dance Convention in Spokane, WA, Betsy was honored by the National Executive Committee for her support, devotion and calling at the National Square Dance Conventions. In 2016 she received the Gold Card Lifetime Membership award for her outstanding contributions to Callerlab.

Roy Gotta—North Brunswick NJ



Roy started Square Dancing in 1972 while still a student at Rutgers University. He was so impressed with the teacher that he married her in 1974. He and Betsy began Round Dancing in 1975 and began teaching Round Dancing in 1978. Roy currently cues and teaches through phase IV. Roy has 3 round dance clubs, through phase 4, and is the club cuer for the Rutgers Promenaders. Guest appearances are usually with his wife Betsy (traveling as a caller/cuer team) but he also does guest cueing appearances by himself. Roy joined Roundalab in 1984 and has served on the Board of Directors and Executive Committee. He was General Chairman from 2014 – 2015. He has attended 37 National Square Dance Conventions, cueing at many of them. With his wife Betsy, he is a member of Callerlab, Roundalab, ARTS-Dance, Contralab, Square Dance Council of NJ, and Callers Council of NJ. In 1992 He and Betsy were General Chairman of the NJ State Square and Round Dance Convention. In 2014 Roy was the round dance program chairman for the Canadian National Square & Round Dance Convention in Ottawa, Ontario. Dances that Roy & Betsy have choreographed

include "Thank God for Kids", "Walking My Baby Back Home", "Love Is..."(Roundalab ROQ), "Send for Me", "A Summer Song", "All Over the World"(Roundalab ROQ), "Rose of San Antone", "How Do You Do It", "You Beat Me To The Punch", "My Love Twostep", "I'm Into Something Good", "Rt 66 Jive", and "Do You Believe In Magic" (Roundalab ROQ).

One of the biggest issues facing our square dance clubs is retention of current and new members. After weeks of classes, many students do not return to the dance floor...many express a lack of confidence, other forget too much after the summer break, and from others we hear 'it was fun BUT...' Many clubs find that seasoned dancers drift away and no longer dance. Perhaps we have forgotten that we are not only a dance clubs but social clubs—and we should plan activities that cultivate both. The panel and audience will discuss several top reasons new dancers do not continue, and share experiences and stories of success to encourage other clubs to retain dancers both on and off the dance floor. Questions and discussion—especially sharing ideas—are highly encouraged.

Howard calls and teaches for over 30 square dance clubs in the tri-state area and has called in England, France, Switzerland, Holland, Norway and toured Germany. He has instructed and dance hosts for Norwegian and Holland America Cruise lines since 2005. Parlour Productions is Howard's theatre company where he produces yearly theatrical events benefiting local organizations.
